It was a very nice gathering for a hot summer evening. The Kamenas were there and I called Swing Like Thunder for their benefit; I think every set in the hall had their girls off their feet for most of the call:

Florence Blume dropped in; her group at the Newark YWCA has closed for the summer. When they open again in the fall, the Sillers will play for them every Monday night. Paul Shea attended -- he imtends to spend the summer in Boston. Marie and Virginnia from the hiking club (IHC) also had an evening of it (and no male shortage)!

the roof --? (I hope)

The Rangers ganged up and presented me with a swell fringed buckskin jacket. Thanks a lot neighbors -- and Mrs. Swislocka, who was also in the suprise. It will sure keep the draughts off my bones when we're out dancing these coming cool nights, I'm glad you

The outing club of the Paterson YMCA held a square dance Thursday evening (June 28), and since Ed and Catherine Laurence are members of that group we got a set of Rangers together to go down and pay them a visit. The affair was scheduled for the roof, but it started to sprinkle at the last moment and they frantically moved into the gym (very hot). A large percentage of beginners, mostly girls, showed up; the majority of them struggled through fairly well. The caller (Josh Hallenbach) wasn't so hot; no spirit and bad timing on the calls, and an apparently poor memory more than outweighed the advantage of a quite fair calling voice.

Gracie Viviano was there, and did she get the daylights swung out of her! (Erwin, the villian). On one set the Ranger's girls sat out while the men took on some of the surplus female contingent. On this I drew a gal that could swing quite well but balked at "swing like thunder" and "pick 'em up". Once, in Boonton, I danced with a girl who acted just like that: her sister later told me on

the side ---- no panties!!

Saturday June 23 at Bill Cairns' was the Siller's last night in New York for the Summer. They will play at Silver Bay until Sept. Bill intends to stay open all summer except the last three Saturdays in July; he will be on vacation at Silver Bay then. Miss Brown will Furnish the music for the summer period.

folk dances, a contra dance and a couple of squares. (I called Swingo Ringo and Roll the Barrel for them). I promised Bill and Winnie that I'd bring down some of my folk dance transcriptions and a great big amplifier some maturday night in August. Perhaps we can get the gang together that night and all go down?

David Hahn has discontinued his Wednasday night group at Irving Plaza for the summer, but Hem Joseph plans to remain open there all summer on Tuesday nights. Miss Brown will be at the piano. Henry also teaches all summer at Arrowhead Lodge in Ellenville N.Y. on weekends. Square and folk dancing on into September.

Two of our members, Dorothy Derks and Gerhardt Adler, took the big leap June 30 and the Rangers were all invited to the reception. We had a jolly evening in spite of the heat, doing assorted folk dances, square dances and jitterbuggings. A great many of the guests had spent their earlier years in Germany, so Landlers and Rheinlanders were quite popular with them. (You should have headd one of the men yip and stamp on the Tyrolean numbers) It was very strange though, to have a German-speaking crowd asking about Obereks and Krakowiaks. I hadn't brought any Polish recordings with me, but it seems that a some of these people came from near the old Polish-German border, where evidently dances disregard political boundry lines, skipping gaily over such imaginary barriers!

Some of the older people, reminiscing of the days of their youth, recalled dances which were apparently the transitions between the old French Court Quadrilles and the later German Bunte Tänze. I'll have to do a bit of snooping on this --- it sounds very interesting. Most of my previous German friends were from Southern ar Central Germany,

and they knew no such dances.

And before I forget to write it up, here is a schottische step that I picked up in Yorkville; I haven't seen it done at any of the

all-nations folk dance groups.

Turnhalle Schottische (Man's part; girl performs the counterpart string with the opposite foot.) Open position, partners holding inside hands. Step diagonally forward with the left foot, step the right foot in front of the left, step diagonally forward with the left again; hop on the left, swinging the right leg across in front at the same time. Repeat to the right starting with the right foot, then take closed position and perform the usual schottische series of four step-hops. Open position, partners holding inside hands. Step diagonally forward with the left foot, bring right up in back of left, step diagonally forward on left again; hop on left swinging right in front at the same time. Repeat to the right starting with the right foot and again perform the four hop-steps. Repeat all ad lib.

Having a Tuesday night free with no dance classes and no calling dates, I decided to relax by visiting two Tuesday night folk groups:Henry Joseph's and Michael Herman's. They were warming up at Henry's by pushing the piano around --- the only cool looking person in the place was Miss Brown, and she hadn't started to play yet! Henry took a bride to himself a couple of weeks ago; did well by himself too, she

is very attractive,

The heat didn't deter the group at all, they danced right along, and after calling a couple of squares for them I left to see what the Hermans were up to these Tuesday nights. I met Paul Shea coming out as I arrived and a number of the regulars were in attendance, including Kitty Toomey. Mary Herman tells me that they started the Tuesday class to teach the more popular dances to the newer crowd and thus take some of the pressure off the Friday night group. They were using both their newfound accordionist and recordings. Michael's C.O. is so impressed with the merits of folk dancing after the recreation work Michael has been doing with convalescent soldiers that he has

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issued a sort of permanent Friday furlough to him so that he can lead his Community Folk Dance Center in person. Mary tells me also that she thinks Helen and I look very lovey-dovey in the O.W.I. film they took for the army. She expects to have a 16 mm copy of it as soon as they can get the priority on the necessary film stock.

Kenneth Balje writes to tell us about square dancing up in the Adirondacks around Gloversville, the beauties of nature and the joys of life in the wildwoods. We'll have to invite him out with the IHC Hiking Club. Other mail included some folk dance literature from Miss Woods in New Zealand. An attractive little paper.

Helen and I went to Egbert Lake on the Fourth with the Guses to spend the day and incidently arrange details of the Rangers overnight dance-camp-hike affair. Details in the dance directory section.

Thursday (July 5) I was guest caller for Ed Durlacher. The rainy weather killed the roof so we danced in the ballroom. Smaller crowd than usual --- I understand this is because of the new rule requiring all comers to become members of the YWCA. However this is more of a technical membership and costs only one dollar. Amusing incident on the way home --- Helen and I (in cowboy costume) were singled out of a subway crowd by a sailor and his girl as the logical people to give him Manhattan street directions. He must have been from Brooklyn; I understand some of the natives there think the great open spaces start at bhe West end of the Brooklyn Bridge and New Jersey is just one of the Texas ranches --- 'all them thar Jersey cow critters???'

We scraped together three couples not on vacation (the Van Sauns and the Guses) and went to Budd Lake on the 6th. Nice and cool there in the hall at the lakeside. I called a set for them -- Marching Through Georgia, the new Lucy Long number, and Swingo Ringo with a swing bonus on the end. The crowd did the figures well, the orchestra (Al Green's) followed beautifully and the applause would have warmed any callers heart. With only three couples the Rangers couldn't do an exhibition square so we put on a medley of polka steps which was

very nicely received.

Al Shaner has his own version of Bell Bottom Trousers. His figures run like this: - Introduction; swing corner - swing partner. First couple separate go around the outside of the set, pass between opposite couple, swing in the center (long swing), everybody dos-a-dos corner, dos-a-dos partner, left elbow swing with corner, right hand to partner and grand right and left around. Repeat with 2nd, 3rd, 4th couples. Shaner, by the way recalls some of the old dances; the Plain Quadrilles, the Glide Lancers, the Loomis Lancers etc. Nice large hall they have there, and a good floor; we would bring the gang up oftener if it wasn't for the doggone gas rationing.

Vasar Farm is also at Budd Lake, and they have Scandinavian dances ere. We'll tell you more about that next time.

Small summertime crowd at Marshall's Saturday night, only 6 or 7 sets on the floor --- plenty of room to swing all over the place. Part of the evening I spent experimenting with the recorder, making a few

transcriptions of Hobart's calls. Matty, Len and the boys hitting it up right under my nose proved to be too much however. By the third set I could no longer control my itching feet; I shut off the recorder and spent the rest of the evening dancing!

If any of you have any calling or teaching dates in mind for me, and especially if they require an orchestre, please let me know as soon as possible; I have already signed up some single nights as far ahead as November and will have at least three nights a week tied up steady when the Fall season gets under way.
