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North Jersey Square Dancing

I presume it's quite logical to start at home for our first issue, so I'll describe the little fancies and oddiments that serve to distinguish the North Jersey squares from those of other sections of the country. Probably the most noticeable single item is the 'Allemande Left'. I've seen visiting callers from 'outside' start an evening off quite auspiciously - - but when they called "Allemande Left" only to be confronted with a hall full of der-vishes doing an endless left elbow reel, their repertoire pretty well broke down! Yes, in North Jersey 'Allemande Left' means 'Left elbow reel with your corners until the next call' - and no amount of coaxing will stop them short of three or four complete revolutions! If you must have the standard Allemande Left, the call is "Left hand round your corner lady".

They Grand Right and Left in most places with the man turning each lady under his arm as they meet, instead of merely giving hands and passing by. This call followed by silence on the part of the caller would be interpreted: "Grand Right and Left halfway around, meet your partner, swing once and promenade home", not G.R. and L. all the way around the ring.

The promenade is always done with the man's arm around the lady's waist, the crossed-hands skating position is never used unless you want to insult the girl - - - and she may have a darn big brother!

The footwork varies with the locality and the individual; walking step, two-step, weave step or chassez being used for the circling, while the G.R. and L. and the figures are usually performed with a plain walking step or the two-step.

The swinging is generally done with the buzz step, but a fairly large percentage have never learned this and do the run-around. Swinging is always very violent; most resorts have a rule about swinging partners off their feet, so it becomes a bit of a game to see how near to the forbidden one can come. When the call requires two men or two ladies to dance together, the the two-handed swing or the Hungarian csardas position is more often used. (This latter innovation, I must confess, is mine.)

A call in Jersey is hardly considered worth dancing to if it isn't sung to the music: spoken calls are very unpopular. The

music consists entirely of old popular songs; favorites being "I Want a Girl", "Red River Valley", "Nellie Gray", "Spanish Cavaliero" and "Mademoiselle from Armentières". However, I have received an enthusiastic welcome for several 'continuous patter' calls chorded to Irish and Scotch jigs and reels. The dancers seem to feel that these are 'singing' calls.

'Right and left' is an almost unknown figure and 'balance your partner' never used. Some callers say; "Honor your partner", but this phrase has lost it's meaning and is just patter.

When 'Ladies Chain' is performed the men do not turn with the ladies, but stand still and then pass the ladies around behind them by passing their hands overhead.

All of the regular resorts follow each set (3 figures) of squares with two or three round dances; usually fox-trots or waltzes with an occasional polka, and sometimes the local version of the varsovienne which differs considerably in various towns.

Aside from the Virginia Reel, contra-dances, circle dances and running sets are unknown except among the Jackson Whites and similiar groups to whom I intend to devote a future article. Deviations from a great deal of the above will be found in the places where I have been polluting the local folkways!

The same members took part with the addition of Helen La Farge, Erwin and Estelle Guse, Gay and Dot Adler, Joe Jeniec, Mary Arrastibia and Marie Larkin. And did the girls in their long old-fashioned dresses wave in the air on 'Flap Like Thunder'! Members of the IHC put on a Harem Dance (all male cast), very funny.

The Rangers presented Helen with a pony-trimmed cowgirl jacket for Christmas as a token of thanks for helping on costumes and for aid in the coaching of the group.

Billy Boy

Tune: the same.

Introduction

Oh, you all join your hands and you circle to the left,
Then you circle to the right, charming Billy;
Swing your little sugar-pie, take it easy or she'll cry,
She's a young thing and cannot leave her mama.

Figure

Oh, the first couple out and you circle to the left;
Four hands around, charming Billy:-
Right hand round the left hand gal,
Swing the one you call your pal,
She's a young thing and cannot leave her mama.
Two couples on and you circle to the left,
Six hands around, charming Billy;
Right hand round your left hand gal,
Swing the one you call your pal,
She's the one that always sleeps with mother.
Three couples on and you circle to the left,
Eight hands around, charming Billy;
Right hand round your left hand gal,
Swing the one you call your pal,
She'll go home and tell it all to mother.

Break

Now it's right hand round your pal,
Left hand round that corner gal,
And a grand right and left, charming Billy;
Meet your partner with a swing,
Promenade around that ring;
Promenade to your places, charming Billy.

Notes

“Right hand round your left hand girl” is just like the standard (not the North Jersey elbow swing) allemand left, except that the right hand is used of the left and the dancers walk around counter-clockwise. The figure and break are repeated for each couple. On the break the orchestra should repeat the last few bars to allow enough time for the promenade.
