A comparatively neglected era for folk dancers and dance revivalists, seems to be the early 1800's. Just why, I don't know: there is a wealth of material hidden away in the archives of the British Museum, the Library of Congress, the New York Public Library and many private collections.

Armed with yards and yards of microfilm from many sources, I pieced together this month's feature article. References for the dances and instructions have been carefully cross-checked, and are found among the following bibliography.

"24 Country Dances for the Year 1810". (Goulding 1810) "Platt's Original and Popular Dances". (1810) "24 Country Dances". (Metralcourt 1800) "Major's Collection". (1820) "A Select Collection of Country Dances". (Ross, 1820) "Quadrille and Cotillion Panorama" (Wilson, 1810?) "Complete System of Country Dancing". (Wilson, 1815?) "The London Court Journal" and other books, mss. etc. too numerous to catalogue here.

These dances represent one of the stages in the transition of the old English Country Dances to our present day New England "Longways Dances". If you like 'em let me know — I have about 1200 more, from 1650 to 1890!

Please note that many of the terms have utterly different meanings as compared with to-day's usage. "Allemand" in the old country dance books is to all intents the "dos-a-dos" of the present day, and the "right and left" bears no resemblance to the figure of the same name in modern square dancing. Better look at the diagrams before you try the dances!

The Figures

SET. A form of balance. A short, springy leap to the right on the right foot (only a few inches). Draw the left foot, toe touching the floor and heel raised, up to the right foot. Repeat to the left.


DOWN CENTER (OR MIDDLE) AND BACK. (Fig. 1) Active couples, right hands joined, man's forearm across his chest, walk down between the lines (8 counts). Turn, cach counterclockwise without releasing hands, the man's arm passing over the lady's head. Return up between lines, taking the place of the original 2nd couple who have moved up one place.....This is the progression. This is not the "cast off" of present day contradances.

FIRST COUPLE SET TO 2nd LADY. See figure 2.

OPPOSITES CHANGE. (Fig. 3-4-5-6) This is the "right and left" of the old country dance books. I have here changed the title to avoid confusion with the use of the term "right and left" to-day. Active couple after progression:—X changes places with B (pass left shoulders). A changes places with Y (pass right shoulders). X changes places with B (pass left shoulders). A changes places with Y (pass right shoulders).

SET CONTRARY CORNERS. (Fig. 7-8-9) After progression:—A crosses over and rets to Y, while X crosses over and sets to C. A and Y, half turn to the right facing each other, pass right shoulders. A goes to Z and sets, while X goes to B and sets. A and X, half turn clockwise and return to starting point.







The Figures



SET AND CHANGE SIDES. (Fig. 10) Ladies A and B set to each other, while gentlemen X and Y set to each other. Ladies join hands and pass between gentlemen, changing sides.

CAST OFF AND BACK AGAIN. See Fig. 11.

DOUBLE TRIANGLE. Couples follow paths shown in Figs. 11-12.


HEY ON OWN SIDE. (Fig 14) Actives face down, inactive-face up. Inactives start up while the actives start down, passing alternately right and left shoulders, counting the turn on the end as a shoulder passed. Continue movement until all regain original places.

SWING CORNERS. (Fig. 15) A swings around X with right hands joined. A swings around Y (left hands) while X swings around C (left hands). A swings around X (right hands). A swings around Z (left hands) while X swings around B (left hands). Both fall back to places.

DOS-A-DOS. As in to day's square dances, except with a wider sweep around. The hands hang loose at the sides.

RIGHT HANDS ACROSS. Moulinet, as in quadrilles.





We thank Mr. Lawrence Loy, of Amherst Mass., for contributing this month's singing call. I guess you're acquainted with his last album of square dance records; his new one (Victor) should be on the counters by the time you get this.

Tune: Solomon Levi. INTRODUCTION Left to the ingenuity of the caller. FIGURE

(Verse) The first head lady and opposite gent just lead up to the right, and circle three around you go and hold her good and tight.

Lady 1 and gentleman 3 lead to couples 2 and 4 respectively, and circle three hands round.

Break those rings and now you make 2 lines upon the side The two upon the heads around the outside now will slide:

Gent 1 and lady 3 go to the right, half around set.

(Chorus) Half-way 'round and up the center, you meet in the center and swing, the other six join hands around and make a great big ring.

Gent. 1 and lady 3 meet in the center and swing while the others circle 6 hands around to the left.

A prettier girl, a nicer girl, a sweeter girl was she, now break that ring and swing your own, you swing your sweet Marie

(Verse) The same head lady and opposite gent go forward to and fro, forward again and pass right through to the opposite side you go:

Lady 1 and gentleman 3 go forward and back, then forward again and cross over.

The ladies two chassez the center, the gents promenade.

The two ladies join both hands and chassez (side step) down the center to the opposite side of the set. As the ladies chassez, the gents walk down the center to the opposite side of the set, gentleman #3 passing to the right of the ladies, gentleman #1 to the left.

The two gents chassez the center, the ladies promenade.

Similiar to above, except gents chassez.

(Chorus) The same four holding the floor, swing your partners to place, you have no money, you got your honey, so give her a good embrace.

Couples 1 and 3 swing to place.

Right and left with with your right hand couple, you have no time to spare. Now right and left right back again, for they're a jolly pair.

Couple 1 does a right and left with couple 2, couples 3 and 4 the same.

(Verse) Now right hands to partners all, and a grand right and left, with head held high you pass her by, go all the way around. Promenade.

REPEAT CALL THREE TIMES
