With the increasing popularity of square dancing there has come an increase in the number of 'caller's nights' (in fact, in certain sections, some of the old-time callers complain that what were originally social events for the callers have become mere personal-profit schemes.)

However, since these events are apparently here to stay it would seem advisable to adopt some sort of standard nomenclature, in order that the reader may know what to expect, since there are at the moment at least three different items known as 'callers nights,' 'guest callers nights' or 'callers jamborees' without distinction.

These terms, depending on user, are variously taken to mean:

(1) An affair to which most of the callers within 40 or 50 miles are invited -- each to call one change.

(2) An evening, usually of continuous square dancing, for which the host caller has secured 4 or 5 of the best (in his opinion) callers, usually from other sections. As a rule these callers have their transportation and expenses paid.

(3) An exchange arrangement in which two callers each with a regular weekly dance, exchange places for an evening to provide variety for the patrons.

This month's singing call was concocted while drilling an exhibition group from Franklin Grange to one of "Pop" Smiths calls for the Connecticut Song and Dance Festival.

- DUDES -

I suppose that the ideal vacation spot for real folk dance enthusiasts would be a resort where the days and nights were a continuous round of square and folk dancing, with the participants all in costume. The summer camp of the Country Dance Society approaches this, but I'm afraid that on the whole, such a heaven is impossible of attainment. A dude ranch however offers a nice active vacation, and the list in the back of this issue is offered as a guide to the ones that offer square dancing.

There are two types of dude ranches; the ones run for "dudes" and the ones engaged in cattle raising with the dudes as a side line. The Eastern ranches belong to the former class. Most (but not all) of the ranches in Canada, Colorado, Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon close for the winter, as do some of the Eastern spots; but with the Arizona, California, Nevada, New Mexico and Texas operators, the winter is the big season. The Eastern ranches that accommodate winter guests usually feature skiing, etc.

Since the active part of a ranch vacation consists to a large degree of riding, it is advised in order to secure maximum enjoyment that the uninitiated put in a couple weeks of daily riding in advance. (In order to develop the necessary callouses in the proper places!)

The favored costumes at most of the ranches are Levis and bright colored gaberdine shirts for riding, etc., and, if the ranch has a large social gathering or of dude square dances are held in a nearby town, a showy rodeo outfit. (Frontier pants and fancy shirts for the men, satin or embroidered blouses and fringed skirts for the ladies.) Such fancy Western outfits are becoming popular with square dancers in the East; I counted 31 at a recent square dance with an estimated 250 attending.

A bit of added excitement for a Western trip can be included if your vacation coincides with one of the annual rodeos. Some of the cow country towns really make a time of these — close down all other business for a week, everybody in costume, lots of whoopee! (The Calgary Stampede was a beaut this year; biggest in history and topped off with 5,000 square dancing on the Hudson's Bay lot.

Rates at the dude ranches vary from \$50 to \$100 per week, all expenses. If you feel up in the chips there are a few that go up to \$200. On the other hand there are places that list rates lower than \$50 — but in most cases you'll find that they have everything in sight listed as 'extra': riding, guides, dancing . . . I even know of one that lists meals as "extra"!

The association will be known as the Folk Dance Leaders Council and these are among the objectives set up:—

- (1) To standardize folk dances with the cooperation of nationality groups and native experts.
- (2) To acquire and learn useable new folk dances.
- (3) To establish a library of folk dance publications, records, films and related material.
- (4) To acquire, produce and publish folk dance music, step notes, films, records and background material, such as pictures and patterns of costumes, etc.
- (5) To acquire suitable quarters for a folk dance center, embracing office, library, meeting place and dance hall.

A summer schedule of meetings was decided upon and the election of officers was postponed to September 22nd, when the leaders who are away on summer engagements will be able to attend. Leaders present included Bill and Winnie Cairns, Laura and John O'Brien, Frances and Harry Scherer, Harry Molbert, Kathleen Leifer, Eugene Tso, Dick Kraus, Murray Sherman, Michael Lekakis and Rod LaFarge. A dozen or more other leaders have asked to be included in the organization, but could not attend this meeting. Apparently the membership will include, with one or two exceptions, all of the international leaders in the Metropolitan area, and plans are afoot to take in other sections of the country.

The Ramapo Rangers picnic at the Van Saun's gardens was enjoyed by a large group of dancing friends. Members prepared a table laden with casserole dishes and salads . . . the 'hot dogs' and hamburgers being left to the individuals to worry about (that meat shortage, you know). SINGING CALL



The Ramblin' Wreck

Tune: The Rambling Wreck from Georgia Tech.

INTRODUCTION

Join your hands and circle left,
 Go halfway round the ring;
 Circle back on the same old track
 And everybody swing:
 You swing your little honey,
 You swing her as you please;
 You swing her till she's off her feet
 And trailin' in the breeze.

FIGURE

The two head couples lead to the right
 And circle in a ring,
 Lead to the left hand couple now
 And do the same old thing.
 All go home and swing your own,
 You swing your partner round;
 Swing that little gal of yours
 All around the town.
 The two head couples lead to the right
 And dos-a-dos all four;
 Lead to the left hand couples now,
 And dos-a-dos once more;
 All go home and swing your own,
 You swing to beat the band;
 Her daddy's waitin' up for you
 With a shotgun in his hand.
 Oh, the two head couples lead to the right
 And turn a right hand star;
 Lead to the left hand couples now,
 Right hands around once more:
 All go home and swing your own,
 The one with the curly hair,
 You swing her round and round and round:
 And kiss her if you dare.

BREAK

Elbow swing your corner girl.

You swing her round and round,
Now put your arm around your own
And promenade the town:

For I'm a jolly fellow,

I drink my whiskey clear;

And I learned to neck at Georgia Tech
With a female Engineer!

Repeat figure and break for the sides.

EXPLANATION

Introduction: rather obvious, no?

Figure: couple 1 leads to couple 2 while couple 3 leads to couple 4, both foursomes join hands and circle left once around, all couples falling back to places. Couple 1 now leads to couple 4 while couple 3 leads to couple 2, the couples repeating the circle left and falling back to place, where they swing their partners. The same pattern is followed for the dos-a-dos and right hand stars.

Break: All swing corners with left elbows (2 or 3 turns) all promenade with own partner, once around the ring.

SPANISH DANCE

This is one of the most popular of the old time dances. Any even number of couples may form for this dance in a circle around the room, odd couples facing even couples (the odd couples face counter-clockwise, the even couples clockwise).

All forward ----- 16 bars

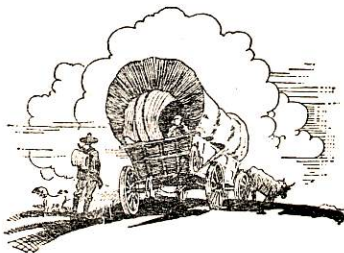
All join hands with partners (to-day, in many sections, only right hands are joined); forward and back; forward again and change partners turning one quarter round, facing each other, [4 bars]; all forward again, and change partners as before, which brings all opposite to the position they first occupied. [4 bars] Repeat the same until all regain places and partners. [8 bars]

Moulinet ----- 8 bars

Each lady gives her right hand to the lady opposite, gentlemen the same; go round [4 bars]; reverse by giving left hands back. [4 bars]

All waltz around ----- 8 bars

Closed waltz position, each couple passing to the right of each other, waltzing once and a half around a little ring, which will bring them opposite new couples with whom they repeat the dance. Repetitions continued until original foursomes meet again,
