



### **NEGLECTED DANCES**

Considering the percentage of Germanic peoples that have gone into the making of this country, their folk dances as such have made but little impress among the international dance groups that have so thoroughly taken to their hearts the Slavonic and Scandinavian dances. There are a few dances of course that are popular (notably Kreuz Koenig, Seftenberger, Marklander and Windmueller) but on the whole the picture is rather bleak when one thinks of the dozens of Bunte Tanze, couple dances, Schuplattler figures, etc. Even the Landler which so many of our folk dancers proudly claim to know is a simple version with the most interesting figures omitted in the interest of "mass-production" teaching. And I have never seen an attempt to teach any of the men's Schuhplattler steps at any of the international folk dance groups. The record situation is just about as bad; there are plenty of German waltzes. landlers, Rheinlanders and some Schottisches that sometimes can be pressed into service for the various folk dances, but not even the popular items mentioned above are available on record; Schuhplattler groups that I know have had recourse to making their own recordings (after all the musicians like to get out and dance too!)

Not to be outdone by the lack of material in other departments, there are only two books that I know of (in English, that is) about German folk dancing. And the majority of the ones in German make darn dry reading for dancers; they were written, for the most part, for and by anthropologists, ethnologists. My own source of information aside from published material has been friends in the Turn Verein, to which organization many of the Schuhplattler members also belong. (So do I . . . when I'm not too busy with this kind of stuff).

About the most complete source of German folklore, although it covers only a special section, is the Home Craft series of booklets on the Pennsylvania Germans published by Mrs. C. Naaman

#### PADDY DEAR

(Tune - Wearing of The Green)

#### INTRODUCTION

Oh, Paddy dear, do you hear, you lead up to the right, You balance to that lady there and swing her nice and light; Then it's up to the next you go, and do a three-hand swing, Return now to your partner and salute the dear old thing.

Now it's allemande left with your corners and a right hand to your own, And a grand right and left you go until you meet your own, You swing her when you meet her, you swing her nice and light, Or there'll be trouble in the shanty when Pat get's home tonight.

#### FIGURE

Now Maggie dear, do you hear, you lead up to the right, You swing that gent that's standing there and hug him nice and tight; Then it's up to the next you go, and do a three-hand swing, Return now to your partner and salute the dear old thing.

Now it's allemande left . . . . (Repeat call for second couple)

Variation between second and third couples:

Now all four ladies join left hands, and circle half-way 'round, Give right hand to your opposite and balance four in line, Swing your opposite, swing your opposite, that's the order of the day, But now that you have swung him you go back the other way.

Now all four ladies join right hands and circle half-way 'round, Give right hand to your partner and balance four in line, Swing your partner, swing your partner by the waning of the moon, But the next gent must be ready to dance when I begin the tune.

Repeat original call for last two couples.

#### Variation

But you'll have no time to spoon, For the next gent will begin to dance when I begin to croon.


